Perception of Teenage

Pregnancy among Secondary School Students in Port Harcourt

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Introduction

- About 40% to 66% of teenagers in the USA are sexually active; often without contraception
- Teenage pregnancy is at high risk for infant & maternal morbidity & mortality.
- Significant psychosocial morbidity for the adolescent mother & father, and the child.
- Pregnancy is the most common cause of school drop-out for adolescent girls.
- Prevention should be the primary goal.
- Scanty data on teenage pregnancy & sevuality issues in Nigeria



Objective:

• To evaluate secondary school student's perception of teenage pregnancy in Port Harcourt, Nigeria.

• Methods:

- A cross-sectional study conducted among a convenient sample of secondary school students in Port Harcourt over one month from 1st to 20th May 2009.
- A structured self designed and self-administered anonymous, questionnaire was used to obtain info.
- Information sought included student's Bio-data, sexual activity if any, contraception use, and actions taken if pregnant occurred.

Results
