Medicosocial Effects on Rehabilitation Program for Victims Of Domestic Violence in Korea

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PURPOSE

- To introduce a rehabilitation program to aid in the independence of 112 victimized women of domestic violence during the past 5 years as a major board member of the Korean Medical Women's Association(KMWA) and YWCA in Korea.
- The rate of domestic violence in Korea has increased from 31.4% in 2001 to 40.3% in 2007.





fig. 3 Incidence of Sexual Violence Between Spouses

Medical activities


- Gynecological health checkups
- Cervical cancer vaccination for daughters of victims
- Korean government established public health service for the victimized
- KWMA made MOU for sexual violence victims

Report on the Gynecological Problems (Based on the research collected during the past 5 years).

 As an OB/GYN, I have served the victims by providing health checkups including cervical PAPsmears, breast examinations and vaginal ultrasonography as the first procedure. The leading symptoms are amenorrhea (11.1%), vaginal spotting (8.6%), irregular menstruation (5.7%), urinary incontinence (2.9%). Other problems include breast fibroadenoma (2.9%) and thyroid disorder (8.6%)

Functions of Temporary Shelter


Residential support, nurturing support, self support, job training, providing information, counseling, self-recognition training, parent role-play training, parent education and legal consults

Medical Viewpoint

- Among 112 victims, 54 persons (48%) had clinical signs.
 One victim was treated for urinary incontinence with a no cost operation. 47 cases of irregular menstruation were cured.
- As the result of a checkup, one woman was able to prevent a breast mass from becoming breast cancer.
- Cervical cancer vaccination for 48 daughters of victims were performed. This is especially important because the daughters of sexual abuse victims are more vulnerable to sexual abuse.
- As a result of KMWA's efforts, the Korean government established a public health service available through designated medical facilities which protect the identities of victims (about 800 women) from their spouses.

Social Viewpoint

- The victims revealed significant changes in their attitudes toward social adjustments, such as building self-esteem, family like bonding among participants, artistic and cultural activities, job training, and utilization of available public services, etc.
- Due to eager fundraising, the government matched the fund to lease 8 halfway houses.

Significant Effects through the Program in the Shelter

- Confidence in their Divorces: They no longer feel a guilty conscience or loyalty to stay with an abusive spouse.
- 2. Positive Self-Esteem: They become confident of the future as they share a sense of autonomy, mutual encouragement, and understanding with other colleagues.
- 3. Independence for the Future: They are eager to be independent by getting jobs through vocational training.
 - At the same time, they are encouraged to use morale and welfare services available such as various artistic activities, counseling therapy, medical treatment, etc.

FUTURE PLAN:

- Need of additional Halfway Houses from Temporary Shelter.
- Leadership training: We plan to train the victimized women to become future leaders who will take care of other victims.
- Violence awareness education for teens.

CONCLUSION:

- The KMWA and YWCA have actively offered variable medicosocial programs to the victimized.
- Medically-many victims become to recognize the self-importance of their health and they learned how to protect themsel ves.
- Socially-victims gained self-esteem and improved their quality of life.

Medically,

- Through gynecological health check ups such as p ap smear, ultrasound, breast sono- and mammo-gra m, pelvic exams, etc., the rate of gynecological dise ase has reduced while the victimized become to rec ognize the self-importance of their health.
- By offering free cervical cancer vaccination for the d aughters of the victims, they become aware of selfesteem for their future life.
- An achievement by KMWA was to have Korean Go vernment become aware of the needs of the establ ishment of the Public Medicaid Program.

Socially,

- The participants have shown significant changes in their attitudes toward social adjustment such as building self-esteem, family like bonding, involving artistic and cultural activities.
- We will continue supporting the group via fundraising for additional Halfway Houses and various training to build their confidence of the future, as well as their children for defense against violence.
