Tobacco is the only legally available consumer product which kills people when it is used as intended: Smokers lose, on average, 10 years of healthy life.



Survival from age 35 for continuing cigarette smokers and lifelong non-smokers among UK male doctors born 1900-1930, with percentages alive at each decade of age

### What are effective tobacco control strategies?

- Efforts to curb the *availability* of tobacco products
- Efforts to curb the *use* of tobacco products
- Efforts to ecucate about the *harms* of toabacco products and the tobacco industry
- Efforts to reduce *exposure* to tobacco smoke in public places
- Monitoring of tobacco *distribution* and *use*
- Exposure of tobacco *industry practices*





## WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC)

The **FCTC** is an international treaty – the **first** legal instrument designed to reduce tobacco-related deaths and disease around the world.



- Ratified 2003, entered into force on 27 February 2005
- Status: ratified by 169 Parties (June 2010)
  - One of the most widely supported UN treaties!

#### Key areas addressed by the treaty:

- Advertising, sponsorship, and promotion
- Protection from exposure to tobacco smoke
- Illicit trade in tobacco products
- Packaging and labeling of tobacco products



# How to curb the growing epidemic





## Curb the *availability* of tobacco products

- End all forms of subsidies to tobacco farming (FCTC Art. 17, 18)
- Comprehensive regulation of the tobacco industry (FCTC Art. 9, 10, 11, 12, 19)
  - Ban of misleading claims or descriptors (health claims, "lights", "mild", "ultra low")
  - Litigation
  - Ban of tobacco industry funding (education, research, cultural events)
- **Combat illicit trade** (FCTC Art. 15, draft Illicit Trade Protocol)
- Ban duty free sales (FCTC Art. 15, draft Illicit Trade Protocol)
- Ban all forms of direct and indirect tobacco advertising / promotion and sponsorship (FCTC Art. 13)



# How to curb the growing epidemic

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## Curb the use of tobacco products



- Education and public awareness (FCTC Art. 12)
- Access to smoking cessation programs (FCTC Art. 14)
  - Primary care
  - Accessible and free Quitlines
  - Affordable pharmacological treatment (free)
- Raise tobacco taxes

#### (FCTC Art.6)

- Best way to cut tobacco use (e.g. excise tax)
- Increase government revenues
- Help young and the poor
- Does not increase smuggling
- Fraction dedicated to fund tobacco control activities

#### Go forward – using treaties

- The Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC)
- Commitment to gender
- Highlighting of women, girls and indigenous peoples
- Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW)
- Women's rights are human rights
- Eliminate discrimination against women in health care

#### Kobe Declaration

(Kobe Conference was a pivotal event in the area of Women and Tobacco)

- Promotion of gender equality
- Inclusion of women as leaders / decision-makers

#### International Women against Tobacco (INWAT)

- Increasing status of women along with tobacco control
