Background

- In Germany 86% of sex workers are women
- 60-80% of female sex workers in Germany are migrants
- Increase of women migrating to engage in sex work
- Since the eastward enlargement of the EU, more women from Eastern and Central Europe
- Studies from other countries indicate that MSW at heightened risk for HIV/STIs
- Raising HIV incidence of migrants in Germany

⇒HIV/STI prevention for MSW is pivotal



Research Questions

- What are barriers and achievements for HIV/STI prevention for MSW in Berlin?
- What are potential new approaches to HIV/STI prevention for MSW in Berlin?
- What additional information is needed to plan HIV/STI prevention services for the target group?




Methods

- Study Approach: Qualitative, inductive
 - Using semistructured interviews with 12 experts
- Data Sources:
 - Partial transcription of interviews
 - Fieldnotes
- Data Analysis:
 - Elements of Grounded Theory (Charmaz)
 - Method for analysis of guided interviews (Schmidt)




Findings- Main Themes






Findings-Achievements and Challenges

Discussion

- Focus on street-based sex work even though 80% of sex work in Germany takes place indoors
- New finding
 - Level of sex education in MSW from Central Europe
- Sex Work a gender issue
- Structural and behavioral/cultural barriers to HIV/STI prevention for MSW
- HIV/STI prevention planning adhering to the model of structural prevention by Etgeton



Recommendations

- Addressing the underlying issues
- Designing effective HIV/STI prevention strategies
 - Involvement of MSW in HIV/STI prevention
 - Interventions for "johns"
- Increase of collaboration on national and international level
- Continuous advocacy for the rights of MSW and sex workers in general
- Further research
